Kentucky Woodland Owners Association, KWOA, respectfully requests that Senator Rand Paul cosponsor the Forest

Conservation Easement Program Act of 2023 (S. 2631), which was introduced by Senators Gillibrand (D-NY) and Wicker (R-MS). We need your boss's support for FCEP now to help ensure it's included in the Senate's bipartisan Farm Bill.

S. 2631 would authorize \$100M/year in discretionary funding for FCEP, making **the marker bill budget neutral**. However, the ultimate goal is for FCEP to be included in the Farm Bill conservation title with mandatory funding. S. 2631 has support from over 170 organizations.

Kentucky's woodlands provides important economic value to Kentucky, from bourbon barrels to toilet paper, and everything in between. This value is further compounded by the environmental benefits ranging from carbon sequestration, healthy air, water, & soils, and wildlife habitat; benefits that also bear economic returns in recreation and non-timber wood products. FCEP is designed to keep forests from being converted to non-forest uses by purchasing development rights – via voluntary conservation easements – from willing private and tribal landowners. Private forests in an FCEP easement can remain working forests, contributing to timber economies and providing numerous environmental benefits to rural and urban communities. FCEP would rename, replace, and expand upon the existing Healthy Forests Reserve Program and serve as a forest-focused complement to the Agricultural Conservation Easement Program. FCEP fills gaps in current federal forest easement programs, including by providing funding for land trust organizations and tribes to acquire forest easements, which doesn't currently exist in any federal forest easement programs.
