US Forest Service PRISM portal is a way to view forest stewardship accomplishments by watersheds, congressional districts, federal priority areas (new name is federal investment areas), state level, county level and US Forest Service regions. You can pull down reports in pdf format. It has several different map layers also. This information is pulled from the national SMART database in which the division uploads all the GIS files for forest stewardship plans. There is an on-line help file.
